If there is one quirky food event that is not to be missed in Oahu it is Waikiki Spam Jam, this year being staged 29 Apr.

The canned meat, which first made its impact on the Hawaiian Islands during World War II, is now a staple.

In fact, more SPAM is consumed per person in Hawaii than in any other state in the US, with

almost seven million cans of SPAM eaten every year in Hawaii. The festival highlight is the Kalakaua Avenue block party, which is on 1600-2200 on the 29th, with the avenue hosting three entertainment stages and numerous stalls selling SPAM creations, Island crafts, and more.

#### **Surfing Championships**



Hawaii may be famed as home to some of the world's gnarliest surf championships, think the Vans Triple Crown, but it is also home to the Adaptive Surfing Championships. On 08-13 May and hosted by AccesSurf, the competition will attract 100 surfers with disabilities from 17 countries. The competition kicks off with a Welcome Ceremony at the Duke Kahanamoku Statue on the eighth, honouring the Native Hawaiian who introduced surfing to the world, with surfers to then hit the waves at the Queens Surf Break in Waikiki from the ninth. #### **Garden To Table**



Oahu's popular Turtle Bay Resort is also home to Kuilima Farm. Located on the mountain side of the resort, the farm provides fresh produce for the property, and farm tours are available. Highlights include the chance to learn about the Hawaiian ahupua'a land division system and farming, exploring the native Hawaiian garden at the centre of the farm, the chance to plant native Hawaiian plants, and sample farm fresh tropical fruits. #### Honolulu Pride



World Pride is returning to Hawai'i 21 Oct, coinciding with LGBTQ+ History Month, National Coming Out Day, and Spirit Day.

Clients visiting Honolulu during this time can join in on the four weeks of festivities, says Hawaiia Tourism, which include nightlife entertainment, from Polynesian luau, live music, food and cocktails at Hula's Bar and Lei Stand, and Tiki's Grill and Bar (local produce with its casual American and Pacific-Rim menu).
